

Freshman catcher Ryan Stafford has played 11 games since he was moved out of the leadoff spot and into the fourth or fifth holes in the lineup. He has responded with an 11-game hitting streak, including eight multiple-hit games, going 24-for-46 (.522) at the plate with three doubles, a triple, one home run and 16 RBIs, and bumping his average up 48 points to .328. A graduate of Folsom High School, Stafford was 5-for-11 in the UC Davis series last weekend and has thrown out 11 would-be base stealers this season while picking off four others.

No. 18 Cal Poly Plays Final Three Regular Season Games of 2022 Season at Hawai'i

Second-Place Mustangs (35-20) Sweep UC Davis and Stretch Winning Streak to 11 Games; Rainbow Warriors (27-22) Sweep UC San Diego and Remain Two Games Behind Cal Poly

Cal Poly (35-20, 20-7 Big West), which has won 11 straight games with series sweeps against CSU Bakersfield, Cal State Fullerton and UC Davis along with a pair of midweek victories versus Pepperdine, plays its final three games of the 2022 season this weekend, visiting Hawai'i (27-22, 18-9 Big West) for a Big West Conference series inside Les Murakami Stadium (cap.: 4,312).

First pitches are set for 9:35 p.m. Thursday and Friday and 4:05 p.m. Saturday (all times Pacific). All three games will be broadcast on ESPN+ and the series also will be aired on ESPN Radio (1280 AM and 101.7 FM) with Chris Sylvester calling the play-by-play. Links for video and audio streams as well as live stats are available on the baseball schedule page at www.GoPoly.com.

The Mustangs (20-7) are two games ahead of Hawai'i (18-9) in the battle for second place in the Big West and need just one win to clinch second place for the fourth time in the last five full seasons. UC Santa Barbara (24-3) clinched the Big West title outright by sweeping UC Riverside at home last weekend.

After a 7-9 start, Cal Poly put together five- and six-game winning streaks, moving 10 games above the .500 mark for the first time since the 2016 season by taking two of three games in back-to-back Big West series on the road at UC Irvine and UC Riverside.

The Mustangs slipped into third place in the Big West following 10-7 (11 innings), 8-3 and 7-3 losses to No. 13 UC Santa Barbara at home on April 29-May 1, but climbed back into second place by sweeping CSU Bakersfield at home and Cal State Fullerton on the road. Last weekend, Cal Poly extended its winning streak to 11 — the longest since the Big West championship 2014 squad won 12 straight — with 11-0, 7-0 and 6-3 victories over UC Davis. Brooks Lee went 7-for-13 with two doubles, three home runs and six RBIs in the series en route to Big West Field Player of the Week honors for the second time this season. Matt Lopez was 6-for-10 with seven RBIs while Ryan Stafford went 5-for-11 with three RBIs as Cal Poly hit .358 in the series, outscored the Aggies 24-3 and compiled a 0.67 staff ERA.

With four new coaches and 13 new players on its 33-man roster, Hawai'i has recovered from an 8-16 start by winning eight straight games and 19 of 24, starting with a 13-9 triumph over UC Santa Barbara in the final game of an early April series in California. The Rainbow Warriors swept UC Riverside and CSU Bakersfield and won series versus UC Davis, Cal State Fullerton, UNLV and CSUS before sweeping UC San Diego last weekend back in California by scores of 7-4, 9-5 and 4-0. Hawai'i had a five-game winning streak snapped Monday night at California Baptist, 6-4.

Mustang Notes

Mustangs at the Plate ...

Cal Poly returned 61 percent of its at-bats and 62 percent of its hits from the 2021 squad which recovered from a midseason slump by winning 11 of its last 12 games for a 31-25 overall mark and fourth-place tie in the Big West. The returnees include seven position starters (25 or more starts) and 13 of last year's 16 pitchers.

The Mustangs opened their 2022 season with a .292 batting average in their three-game series against Washington and followed that with a .304 mark against Missouri State and .336 at UNLV. Against Harvard, the average dipped to .213 and the Mustangs swept CSUN despite a .247 average and won the series at UC San Diego while hitting just .257. Cal Poly hit .326 in the four-game sweep against Dixie State but dropped to .226 in a series win over Long Beach State and .238, also in a series win against UC Irvine. The Mustangs hit .311 versus UC Riverside, .220 against UC Santa Barbara, .362 versus CSU Bakersfield, .319 against Cal State Fullerton and .358 in their sweep of UC Davis with Brooks Lee going 7-for-13 with two doubles, three home runs and six RBIs. Matt Lopez was 6-for-10 with seven RBIs and Ryan Stafford 5-for-11 with three RBIs.

The Mustangs, who hit .291 in 2018, best in the Big West, fell to .260 in 2019 and .231 (the lowest team batting average in 26 Division I seasons) in 2020 before bouncing back with a .277 average in 2021. This year, Cal Poly is hitting .292 through 55 games, No. 1 in the Big West, with series wins over Missouri State, CSUN, UC San Diego, Dixie State, Long Beach State, UC Irvine, UC Riverside, CSU Bakersfield, Cal State Fullerton and UC Davis and a four-game split with Harvard. The Mustangs have won eight of nine Big West series so far.

Joe Yorke hit safely in 20 straight games before going 0-for-4 Sunday. He was 45-for-92 (.489) during the run with eight doubles, three home runs and 24 RBIs, lifting his average 105 points from .252 to .357. The run by Yorke included a pair of five-hit games (May 6 versus CSU Bakersfield and May 10 against Pepperdine), the first to do it twice in the Mustangs' 28-year Division I history. Brooks Lee's hitting streak of 19 games (30-for-72, .417) with 10 doubles, five home runs and 19 RBIs, the longest in Lee's career at Cal Poly, was snapped by Long Beach State on April 9. Ryan Stafford had a 10-game streak snapped by Dixie State on April 3. Current longest hitting streak is 12 games by Lee while Stafford has hit in 11 straight games. Lee also had a 19-game streak of reaching base safely earlier this year. Yorke has the longest current streak at 29 and Nick Marinconz had his streak of reaching base safely 16 times snapped by Fresno State. Longest hitting streak by a Mustang in 2021 was 12 by Lee, who also had an 11-game streak and catcher Myles Emerson hit in 10 straight. Cal Poly produced 12 multiple-hit games in the Missouri State series. Lee now has 26 multiple-hit games and 13 multiple-RBI contests in 55 contests.

For the season, the Mustangs are hitting .294 with runners on base, .306 with runners in scoring position, .21-for-87 (.241) with the bases loaded (Joe Yorke with four, Brooks Lee and Tate Samuelson with three each) and .291 with the bases empty en route to a .292 team batting average. Matt Lopez was 4-for-5 with the bases loaded a year ago.

Cal Poly is hitting .280 against lefties and .295 against right-handers. Leadoff hitters have reached base 39.7 percent of the time and the Mustangs are 16-for-76 (.211) as pinch-hitters (3-for-5 in UC Irvine series but 0-for-9 against UCSD). Mark Armstrong has four pinch hits while Matthias Haas and Collin Villegas each have three. Second baseman Taison Corio was 4-for-9 as a pinch-hitter a year ago. Kevin Morgan led the team in pinch hits three consecutive seasons (four in 2017, five in 2016, four in 2015).

Mustangs on the Mound ...

While the percentages on offense are relatively high, Cal Poly's pitching numbers are even higher, returning 76 percent of the innings, 74 percent of the strikeouts, 71 percent of the wins and 71 percent of the starts off last year's squad.

For the second straight year, Cal Poly's pitching rotation consists of Drew Thorpe on Friday and Boise State transfer Travis Weston on Saturday. Kaden Sheedy, who started four games during the final six weeks of the 2021 season, started the first four Sunday games and Dylan Villalobos the last 10. Freshman Steven Brooks has started eight games, mostly midweek contests. The relief corps is led by Kyle Scott, Derek True and Jason Franks along with several newcomers.

The 2012 pitching staff set a school record with a 3.48 ERA, which held up for one year as the 2013 mound corps lowered the mark to 3.40. The 2014 staff had a record-shattering 3.05 ERA and posted 10 shutouts en route to Cal Poly's last appearance in an NCAA regional while the 2016 staff notched four shutouts and a 4.09 ERA. The 2017 team also earned four shutouts and a 3.61 ERA while the 2018 team finished with a 4.59 ERA and another four shutouts (three combined). The 2019 squad had a 4.45 ERA (third in the Big West) with two shutouts while the 2020 staff posted a 3.11 ERA. Last year's team sported a 4.44 ERA, fifth in the 11-team conference. This year: 4.94 ERA, No. 6 in the Big West.

Mustangs on the Basepaths ...

Cal Poly, which swiped 81 of 102 bases in 2009, second-most in Larry Lee's 17 seasons at the helm of the Mustangs (the 2004 squad stole 90 bases), stole just 17 of 30 bases last spring, Cole Cabrera leading the way with three swipes. Five of those steals came in the Feb. 29 win against Michigan. The Mustangs were 5-for-5 versus UC Riverside last year. Cabrera led the way for the season with five steals in eight tries. The Mustangs were just 22 of 36 in steals in 2019 and are 8-for-18 so far this season (Brooks Lee and Ryan Stafford with three each), the fewest in the country.

Mustangs in the Field ...

Cal Poly, which set the school record for fielding percentage in a season at .979 last spring, played errorless defense in all three games of the UC San Diego series and 22 total for the season, tied with Long Beach State for No. 1 in the Big West with a .974 fielding percentage. A year ago, Cal Poly opened the season with seven errors in the four-game Nevada series and added five more errors at USC before turning it around with only one miscue in the Utah Valley, CSU Bakersfield, Cal State Fullerton and Hawai'i series and zero at UC Davis. The Mustangs were No. 1 in the Big West with that .979 mark. Cal Poly broke the school record with a .978 fielding percentage in 2012, committing just 46 errors in 56 games, before breaking the mark again in 2021.

Head Coach Larry Lee

After serving as head baseball coach at Cuesta College for 16 seasons, Larry Lee was hired on July 22, 2002 to guide the Cal Poly baseball program. He is 612-475-2 in 19-plus seasons with the Mustangs. After a 27-28-1 record and a fourth-place finish in the Big West Conference in 2003, Lee guided the Mustangs to four straight winning seasons, including 38 wins in 2004. Cal Poly earned its first NCAA Division I regional playoff berth in 2009, and the Mustangs were 40-19 in 2013 and 47-12 in 2014, earning their second and third regional berths. Cal Poly has finished at or above the .500 mark 18 times in the last 20 years, claimed its first Big West title in 2014 and has placed second six times. Lee's 612 wins are 64 more than the old Big West record and his 270 conference wins are No. 1 in the Big West as well.



Lee led Cuesta to the California Community College State Final Four on four occasions, all in the last 11 years of his tenure. The Cougars reached the state's Final Four in 1992, 1997, 2001 and 2002 and qualified for the Southern California Regionals each of the last six years of his tenure, including a No. 1 seed in 1999 and No. 2 in 2002.

Lee's overall record for 16 years at Cuesta was 460-241-3, including a state-leading 44 wins in 1997. His teams qualified for the regionals 11 times in the last 13 years. Under Lee's leadership, Cuesta claimed nine Western State Conference titles, including the last six in a row, and averaged 38 wins during that six-year stretch. His teams produced a 267-119 record in conference games.

Assistant Coaches

Ben Greenspan, assistant baseball coach at Arizona State for seven seasons, including the last four as associate head coach, was hired as an assistant coach at Cal Poly in July 2021. Greenspan works primarily with the Mustang catchers and also will assist with the team's offense. He also is the Mustangs' recruiting coordinator. With the Sun Devils, Greenspan coached the offense, worked with the catchers and was the team's recruiting coordinator. During Greenspan's tenure, Arizona State earned NCAA regional berths in 2015, 2016, 2019 and 2021. Prior to his time in Tempe, Greenspan spent six seasons as an assistant coach at Indiana, including the last year (2014) as recruiting coordinator, and worked extensively with the team's catchers and hitters. The Hoosiers' offense ranked in the top 25 in the nation in batting average, slugging percentage, total hits and extra-base hits in 2014. Greenspan played two seasons at Indiana and was a Hoosier team captain and Academic All-Big Ten performer in 2007.

Jake Silverman, an assistant coach at Cal State Fullerton, UCLA and Nevada over the previous 11 seasons, was hired as an assistant coach at Cal Poly in August 2019, in charge of the pitching staff. Silverman worked with the catchers, served as recruiting coordinator and also assisted with hitting and base running at Nevada the last four years (2016-19). He spent five seasons (2011-15) with UCLA as an assistant to the pitching coach, helping the Bruins compile a 202-103-1 record in that span with four post-season appearances. Silverman and UCLA earned two trips to the College World Series, including the Bruins' national championship season in 2013. Silverman also coached at Cal State Fullerton as an undergraduate assistant for two seasons (2009-10). In two seasons as an undergraduate assistant coach at Cal State Fullerton, Silverman helped the Titans advance to the College World Series in 2009 and to an NCAA Super Regional in 2010. A native of Tustin, Calif., Silverman is a 2005 graduate of Foothill High School in Santa Ana. At Fullerton College, he batted .350 in 16 games as a freshman in 2006. In 2007, he earned the Art Nunn Award for exemplary acts on and off the field while seeing action in 14 games.

Justin Bridgman, who served as graduate manager at Arizona last spring following a four-year playing career at Nevada and two seasons in the Minor Leagues, was hired as a volunteer assistant coach at Cal Poly in July 2020. A graduate of Damonte Ranch High School in Reno, Nevada, Bridgman became a starter as a true freshman at Nevada and appeared in 203 games for the Wolf Pack, hitting .311 with 33 doubles and 75 RBIs with 33 steals. He was primarily a second baseman early in his career with the Wolf Pack before becoming a shortstop as a junior and senior. Earning second-team All-Mountain West Conference honors as a senior with a .313 average and named to the All-Mountain West Tournament Team as a junior after hitting .351, Bridgman was drafted by the Tampa Bay Rays in the 28th round in 2017 and played for four teams in the minors -- Princeton, Hudson Valley, Charlotte and Bowling Green -- hitting .281 with 11 doubles and 34 RBIs in 100 games. Bridgman hit .445 as a senior at Damonte Ranch High and stole a school-record 42 bases. Bridgman is a 2017 graduate of Nevada with a degree in economics.

Mustang Notes

Last Week ...

Cal Poly defeated Pepperdine in a midweek game, then swept a three-game Big West series at home versus UC Davis to extend its winning streak to 11 games. On **Tuesday**, **Steven Brooks** pitched four scoreless innings and **Joe Yorke** produced multiple hits for the seventh time in his last 11 games as Cal Poly wrapped up the non-conference portion of its 2022 schedule with a 14-6 victory over Pepperdine at Eddy D. Field Stadium. **Brett Borgogno** knocked in three runs with three hits and a sacrifice fly while **John Lagattuta** also had three hits for the Mustangs. After a scoreless first inning, Cal Poly erupted for five runs in the second frame and never looked back. On **Friday**, **Drew Thorpe** regained the national lead in strikeouts with a dozen, **Brooks Lee** belted his 13th home run of the season to go along with a pair of doubles and **Matt Lopez** knocked in three runs as Cal Poly blanked UC Davis 11-0. Thorpe, who now has 139 strikeouts this season, one shy of Cal Poly's all-time record for strikeouts in a season (Erik Bratlien struck out 140 in 1988), is three ahead of both Parker Messick of Florida State and Shemar Page of Grambling, each likely with one more start in the regular season. Lee moved into a tie for ninth place with Mitch Haniger (2012) and Jimmy Van Ostrand (2006) in Cal Poly's record book for home runs in a single season, leading off the fourth inning with a solo blast to right field, and his two doubles lifted his season total to 24, three short of the record 27 two-baggers he collected in 2021. Lopez capped a four-run first-inning rally with a two-run double down the left-field line and added an RBI single to left-center field in the seventh for his ninth multiple-hit game of the season. On **Saturday**, **Travis Weston** earned his second complete-game shutout of the 2022 season and third of his Cal Poly career, scattering five hits and striking out nine in a 7-0 victory. Weston (6-3), pitching in his final home game as a Mustang, lowered his ERA from 4.50 to 4.03 as he did not walk a batter and retired the side in order six times in his eighth quality start of the year. **Tate Samuelson** and **Reagan Doss** produced RBI singles for a 2-0 lead in the second and **Joe Yorke**, who extended his hitting streak to 20 games with a single in the first inning, belted his fourth home run of the season, a two-run shot to right field in the fourth inning, as Cal Poly doubled its lead to 4-0. The third single of the game by **Matt Lopez** plated another run in the seventh and **Brooks Lee** smashed his 14th home run of the season, also a two-run shot to right field, in the eighth. On **Sunday**, **Matt Lopez** smashed a three-run home run and **Brooks Lee** added a two-run blast among his three hits as Cal Poly completed its sweep of the Aggies on Senior Day with a 6-3 victory. One of 10 Mustangs playing their final home game, Lopez's fourth home run of the season, on an 0-1 pitch to left-center field, gave Cal Poly a 4-0 lead in the third inning. Lee made it 6-0 with his 15th home run of the year on a full-count pitch, also to left-center field, in the fourth frame. Lee's shot moved him into a tie for fifth place with Grant Desme (2007) and Luke Yoder (2010) in Cal Poly's record book for home runs in a single season. Lee also has 25 home runs in his Mustang career, fifth all-time at Cal Poly.

National Rankings

As a team, Cal Poly's highest national ranking is ninth in both strikeout-to-walk ratio (3.19) and walks allowed per nine innings (3.06). The Mustangs also are No. 11 in sacrifice flies (32), 13th in shutouts (5), No. 17 in doubles (123), 31st in hits (565) and 33rd in strikeouts per nine innings (9.8). Individually, **Drew Thorpe** is No. 1 in strikeouts with 139 (three ahead of Parker Messick of Florida State and Shemar Page of Grambling), seventh with his 0.86 WHIP, 10th with nine victories, No. 15 in strikeouts per nine innings (12.94) and 32nd in strikeout-to-walk ratio (5.79). **Brooks Lee** is No. 5 with 24 doubles and also is 64th in on-base percentage (.476), 20th in hits (83), 22nd in total bases (154), 34th in walks (44) and 64th with his .374 batting average. Thorpe and **Travis Weston** are tied for No. 13 with 14 starts on the mound. **Ryan Stafford** is 13th with six sacrifice flies while **Jason Franks**' nine saves are No. 30 and his 29 appearances are No. 21.

Cal Poly a Winner in Season Openers

Cal Poly, which opened the 2021 campaign, its 27th season of competition at the NCAA Division I level, with a 4-0 win over Nevada, is 18-10 in season openers as a Division I school, winning eight of the last 11 but falling to Washington 6-5 in the 2022 opener. The Mustangs had won six straight season openers from 2001-06, then lost five straight. Cal Poly blanked Connecticut 5-0 in the 2020 season opener at the MLB4 Tournament in Scottsdale, Arizona. The Mustangs defeated Cal Lutheran 8-6 in their first game as a Division I school in 1995 and earned a thrilling season-opening 12-inning 6-5 win over Stanford in 2001 in the first game played in Baggett Stadium. Larry Lee won his first four season openers, eight of his last 10, and is now 12-8 in openers.

Weekly Conference Honors

Cal Poly's first Big West Player of the Week for 2022 was shortstop **Brooks Lee** after going 19-for-30 during an eight-game hitting streak, all multiple-hit contests, in the second and third weeks of the season. He was 8-for-16 in four games the week of March 1-6. Lee earned his second such honor May 23 after hitting home runs in four consecutive games versus Pepperdine and UC Davis. Lee also was Big West player of the week three times in 2021. **Collin Villegas**, 9-for-17 with five doubles and 10 RBIs in five games, was named field player of the week April 4. **Ryan Stafford** (8-for-11, one home run, five runs scored, six RBIs versus CSU Bakersfield) earned the same honor May 9 and **Joe Yorke** (11-for-19, four doubles, 11 RBIs) claimed the award May 16. **Drew Thorpe** earned his second career Big West Pitcher of the Week award following his three-hit shutout with 11 strikeouts against Harvard on March 11 and his third such honor March 28 after striking out 15 UC San Diego batters. In 2020, Thorpe was Cal Poly's first pitcher honored by the Big West after his 13-strikeout performance over eight scoreless innings against BYU on Feb. 22. Freshman **Noah Larkin**, who earned wins against Santa Clara (5.0 innings, one run, three hits) and Dixie State (6.1 scoreless innings, three hits), was named pitcher of the week April 4.

Playoff Bound ...

Three of Cal Poly's 22 opponents on the 2022 schedule earned NCAA regional playoff berths in 2021 -- Big West champion UC Irvine and runner-up UC Santa Barbara along with Stanford. The Mustangs will play seven games against those three squads this year, winning two of three games against the Anteaters on April 14-16 and hosting Stanford on April 19 and the Gauchos on April 29-May 1. Cal State Fullerton's streak of 27 consecutive seasons in the postseason came to an end in 2019.

Mustang Notes

Coach Lee Tops in the Big West ...

Cal Poly's **Larry Lee** moved to the top of the Big West among head coaches in conference wins when his Mustangs defeated UC Davis 6-5 on April 14, 2019. His 219th Big West victory surpassed Cal Poly alum and former Long Beach State head coach **Dave Snow**, who coached the Dirtbags to 218 Big West wins from 1989-2001. Lee is now 270-193 in 18-plus Big West seasons. At USC on Feb. 26, 2021, Lee surpassed **Bob Bennett** of Fresno State for the overall Big West record with his 548th career victory in the opener of the series. Lee is now 612-475-2 overall.

Setting the Records Straight ...

Brooks Lee smashed the school's all-time single-season doubles record with 27 last season, surpassing **Taber Maier**'s 25 in 1997. **Drew Thorpe** moved into the top 10 in strikeouts as his 104 are No. 10. **Tate Samuelson** compiled 701 career at-bats through the 2021 season, No. 7 on the list. The lone all-time team record broken was fielding percentage as the Mustangs committed just 43 errors in 56 games for a .979 mark, eclipsing the 2012 team's .978 mark.

More Records ...

When one considers just the 27 Division I seasons the Mustangs have completed, numerous records were broken last year. For a single game, **Brooks Lee**'s three doubles against UCLA tied a mark and four pitchers joined 72 others pitching nine innings in one game. For a single season, Lee's 27 doubles and seven intentional walks along with **Travis Weston**'s shutout and **Joe Yorke**'s 458 putouts all are No. 1. In a career, Thorpe's 10.27 strikeouts per nine innings, **Tate Samuelson**'s 19 double play grounders and **Myles Emmerson**'s 82 stolen bases allowed are new records. The team broke several season marks, including sacrifice flies (34), fewest steals (17), fewest steal attempts (30), lowest stolen base percentage (.567), fewest sacrifice bunts (20), most fly outs (611), highest fielding percentage (.979) and fewest errors (34), and two single-game records for most sacrifice flies (4 vs. CSUN) and walks allowed (15 vs. CSUN).

Mustang Foes in the Top 30

Ten of Cal Poly's 22 opponents on the 2022 baseball schedule were ranked in the preseason polls, led by Stanford at No. 3 by Perfect Game and Nos. 5, 6 and 7 in the other polls. UC Irvine was ranked from No. 14 to No. 20 in the polls while Long Beach State's highest preseason was No. 24 by D1Baseball.com. Cal Poly, ranked No. 1 for a week by Collegiate Baseball Newspaper in 2014, finished ranked from Nos. 18-20 in all five major polls and was ranked No. 47 in this year's preseason poll by the same agency. Cal Poly's highest ranking in 2013 was No. 16 in the Collegiate Baseball poll before losing two of three games to Cal State Fullerton. In 2012, the Mustangs were ranked No. 22 by Collegiate Baseball Newspaper after its 7-1 start and No. 27 in early April after sweeping UC Irvine before falling back. Cal Poly was ranked as high as No. 22 by Baseball America in 2006 after jumping to a 9-2 start, but lost 12 of its next 19 games to fall out of the polls. The Mustangs were briefly ranked by Collegiate Baseball Newspaper in 2007 after winning 10 of 12 games early in the season. Cal Poly was ranked as high as No. 12 by Collegiate Baseball and Baseball America after getting off to a 17-4 start in 2009. In 2016, Cal Poly was No. 19 in the Collegiate Baseball Newspaper poll on April 25 before the Mustangs were swept at Long Beach State. Cal Poly was never ranked during the 2017 and 2019 seasons but received some votes in a few preseason polls in 2018 and earned a No. 17 ranking in early April 2022, its first national ranking in six years, before falling back.

Waiting Until the Last Moment ...

Cal Poly earned its first walk-off win of the 2021 season April 17 versus UC Irvine, scoring three unearned runs in the ninth inning for a 4-3 triumph. Nick Marinconz singled off the left-field wall for the game-winning hit. The only other walk-off win of 2021 came courtesy of a ninth-inning bases-loaded walk to Cole Cabrera against Hawai'i on May 29. Three of Cal Poly's five wins in the pandemic-shortened 2020 season were walk-offs. First was against none other than defending national champion and then-No. 1 ranked Vanderbilt on Feb. 16. Sacrifice flies by Cabrera and Tate Samuelson in the bottom of the ninth inning lifted the Mustangs from an 8-7 deficit to a 9-8 victory. The Mustangs also posted a walk-off 5-4 victory over No. 5 Michigan on Feb. 29 as Taison Corio singled to deep center field with the bases loaded in the 10th inning and notched No. 3 with a 2-1 triumph over Baylor on March 6 as Cabrera singled down the left-field line with the bases loaded in the 11th frame. In 2019, Cal Poly earned two walk-off wins, both in the Columbia series — Cabrera's RBI single on March 8 and Nick DiCarlo's run-scoring grounder to second base in the 12th inning March 9. The Mustangs also had two walk-off wins in 2018 — a wild pitch in the 10th inning against New Mexico on March 12 and another wild pitch while San Diego State was trying to intentionally walk Colby Barrick on March 17. Cal Poly earned three walk-off wins in 2017 — Kyle Marinconz tripled to score Nick Meyer from first base in the 13th inning against Wichita State, the Mustangs edged Nebraska 3-2 on Meyer's single to left field which scored Brett Binning from second base in the ninth inning, and in a 6-5 win over CSUN as Meyer singled to drive in Alex McKenna in the ninth inning. Cal Poly earned four walk-off wins in 2016, one in 2015, a 4-3 triumph in 12 innings over Long Beach State as Zack Zehner hit a leadoff home run, and two in 2014. In sharp contrast, Cal Poly earned seven walk-off wins in 2009, including five in extra innings, en route to a berth in the NCAA Tempe Regional.

Reaching the 30-Wins Milestone

Cal Poly has won 30 games this season for the 14th time since and including 2000 (four times in the last six full seasons). The 2004 Mustangs reached 30 wins on April 9, becoming the second quickest Cal Poly team to reach the plateau. Cal Poly's 1977 squad won its 30th game on April 5 and finished 41-20 while the 2014 squad earned its 30th win April 13. The 2016 squad reached 30 wins on May 22 and the 2018 club earned win No. 30 on the final day of the season (May 26). The 2004 Mustangs reached 20 wins on March 21, third quickest in school history. The 1997 team was 20-3 on March 12, finishing 37-21, while the 1977 team picked up its 20th win on March 20. Cal Poly's 2005 squad reached 30 wins on May 1, hit the 30-win mark in 2007 on May 25 and the 2018 squad won its 30th on May 4. The 2009 team reached the 30-win mark on April 28 en route to a 37-21 season and an NCAA Regional berth. That team was 20-7 on April 4. Since the NCAA's uniform start date was implemented in 2008, the fastest team to 20 wins is the 2014 squad, hitting the mark on March 24. The 2013 squad accomplished the feat on March 30, five days faster than the 2009 team's 20th win on April 4. Fastest team to 30 wins since the 2008 uniform start date is the 2009 team (April 28). Only four Cal Poly teams have reached 40 wins in a season -- the 1977 and 1992 squads both winning 41 contests, the 2013 team earning 40 wins and the 2014 squad reaching 47 during the NCAA San Luis Obispo Regional.

Mustang Notes

Turn Out the Lights

Cal Poly, just 21-31 at night from 2001-03, reversed that trend the next three seasons, going 37-23 under the lights. In 2007 Cal Poly was 12-11 at night and 20-13 under the sun. In 20-plus seasons at Baggett Stadium, Cal Poly is 385-230 -- 167-116 in day games and 218-114 at night. Overall in 2009, the Mustangs were 21-10 in night games and 16-11 under the sun. In 2008 Cal Poly was 10-16 in day games and 14-16 at night. The Mustangs were 18-8 at night and 9-18 under the sun in 2011. In 2012 Cal Poly was 19-7 at night and 17-13 in day games. In 2013, the numbers were 18-11 at night and 22-8 in day games while in 2014 it was 22-5 in day games, 25-7 at night. In 2015: 8-15 during the day and 19-12 at night. In 2016, the Mustangs were 16-15 at night and 16-10 under the sun. In 2017: 13-16 during the day and 15-12 at night. In 2018, Cal Poly was 17-9 at night and 13-18 during the day, while the 2019 club was 18-16 during the day and 10-12 at night. The Mustangs played nine day games in 2020, going 4-5, and were 1-6 in night contests. Last year: 9-7 in night games, 22-18 in day contests and 20-13 at home. This year the Mustangs are 20-10 in day games, 15-10 at night, 21-11 at home and 14-9 on the road.

Big West Preseason Poll

Cal Poly entered the 2022 season expected to finish fourth in the Big West Conference this spring, according to a preseason poll of the 11 head coaches. That's exactly where the Mustangs were predicted to finish last year and Cal Poly did just that, tied for fourth with UC San Diego and CSUN. This year, Long Beach State garnered seven first-place votes and 97 points for the top spot, followed by defending Big West champion UC Irvine (three first-place votes, 92 points) and UC Santa Barbara (one first-place vote, 81 points). Last year, the preseason poll listed UCSB first, Long Beach State second and UC Irvine third. Instead, UC Irvine won the title with UCSB second and Long Beach State third. UCSB, picked to finish fifth in 2019, instead earned its first Big West crown in 33 years. In 2014, the Mustangs earned their highest preseason ranking in the Big West when Cal Poly was picked to finish No. 2 and went on to capture its first Big West title. Cal Poly has finished in the upper half of the Big West standings 16 times in Larry Lee's 18 full seasons at the helm (not counting 2020), including second-place finishes in 2005, 2012, 2013, 2017, 2018 and 2019 and the championship in 2014. The pollsters were correct for four straight years when Cal State Fullerton was picked to win the 2010, 2011, 2012 and 2013 titles and did so.

All-Big West Conference

Six Cal Poly baseball players were honored by the Big West in 2021, including first-team selections **Brooks Lee** and **Myles Emmerson**. Lee also was named co-Field Player of the Year and Co-Freshman Field Player of the Year while Emmerson was a tri-Defensive Player of the Year. A quartet of Mustangs made the honorable mention list — pitchers **Andrew Alvarez**, **Travis Weston** and **Kyle Scott** along with designated hitter **Matt Lopez**. A total of 55 Mustangs have been named to the all-conference first team since Cal Poly joined the Big West in 1997, including players of the year Lee (2021), **Mark Mathias** (2014), **Mitch Haniger** (2012), **Grant Desme** (2007), **Kyle Blumenthal** (2005) and **Alex McKenna** (2018). Lee (2021), **Matt Jensen** (2009), Haniger (2010) and **Nick Meyer** (2016) have been named Big West Freshman Field Player of the Year. Emmerson (2021) joins Meyer (2018), **Peter Van Gansen** (2015) and **Chris Hoo** (2014) as Defensive Player of the Year.

Big Crowds for Mustang Home Games ...

Cal Poly averaged better than 2,000 fans for the three-game season-opening Washington series, drawing a total of 6,129. That's No. 9 on the all-time list of crowds for a weekend series at Baggett Stadium. Add the 6,385 for the Long Beach State series (No. 7 on the list), 2,738 for Stanford (the largest for a midweek game in program history) and 8,250 for the UC Santa Barbara series (second-largest in stadium history, including 3,032 for the Saturday game, No. 4 all-time) and the Mustangs averaged 1,900 this season, a record for the facility. Last year, Cal Poly played its first 11 home games without any fans before starting to allow fans to games in early April — 20 percent capacity (628) for three weekend series, increased to 33 percent capacity (1,045) for the two home series in May. All 19 games were sold out. Not counting the 12 games in which attendance was limited to under 1,000 in 2021, Cal Poly has drawn at least 1,000 fans for 123 consecutive home games dating back to March 12, 2018, a rainy 5-4 walk-off 10-inning win over New Mexico as Nick Meyer scored on a wild pitch. The Mustangs have exceeded 1,000 fans in 153 of its last 154 home games that did not have COVID restrictions. Old mark for a full season was 1,659 for 34 home dates in 2014, including the NCAA San Luis Obispo Regional. That figure includes crowds of 2,188, 2,072 and 2,489 for the UC Santa Barbara series, 2,402, 2,831 and 2,614 for the Cal State Fullerton set, 2,582, 2,742 and 2,466 for UC Irvine and 2,922, 2,941, 2,473 and 2,937 in four regional games. The season average was No. 39 among 302 NCAA Division I baseball teams. The Cal Poly average also was No. 7 among the 47 schools in the five conferences in the West Region and No. 3 behind Hawaii'i and Cal State Fullerton in the Big West Conference. A six-game total of 15,510 fans attended the 2014 San Luis Obispo Regional. The 2020 season, shut down after four weeks, averaged 1,729 for 11 home games. The Mustangs averaged 1,511 for 30 home dates in 2019, surpassing the 1,000 mark in each game for the first time in Baggett Stadium history. The Mustangs averaged 1,540 for 30 home dates in 2018 and averaged 1,524 fans for its 27 home games in 2017, including a season-high 2,850 in the middle game of the Cal State Fullerton series and an average of 2,261 for the series against the Titans. Cal Poly's top 10 crowds for a single game are 3,284 for Cal State Fullerton on May 6, 2005; 3,274 for the Long Beach State game on April 23, 2004; 3,110 for Stanford on Jan. 21, 2001, the first game played at Baggett Stadium; 3,032 for UC Santa Barbara on April 30, 2022, 2,941 for Pepperdine on May 31, 2014; 2,937 for Pepperdine on June 1, 2014; 2,922 for Sacramento State on May 30, 2014; 2,850 for Cal State Fullerton on April 22, 2017, 2,837 for UC Santa Barbara on April 29, 2022, and 2,738 for Stanford on April 19, 2022. Top nine crowds for a three-game series are 8,585 for Cal State Fullerton on May 6-8, 2005; 8,250 for UC Santa Barbara on April 29-May 1, 2022; 7,847 for Cal State Fullerton in 2016, 7,790 for UC Irvine, also in 2016, 6,782 for Cal State Fullerton in 2017, 6,749 for the UCSB series in 2016, 6,385 for this year's Long Beach State series, 6,384 for Cal State Fullerton in 2013 and the 6,129 for the Washington series earlier this year.

Ironman Trophy

So far this spring, **Brooks Lee**, **Ryan Stafford** and **Joe Yorke** have started all 55 games played. Two Mustangs — **Myles Emmerson** and **Nick DiCarlo** — started all 56 games played in 2021. Five Mustangs started all 16 games in the pandemic-shortened 2020 season. **Elijah Greene** was the lone Mustang who started all 56 games in 2019. **Alex McKenna** and **Kyle Marinconz** started all 57 games in 2018 while **Tate Samuelson** started the first 55. McKenna and Marinconz also were the only Mustangs to start all 56 games in 2017. **Josh George** played all 56 games with 49 starts. In 2016, **Brett Barbier**, **Michael Sanderson** and Marinconz started all 57 games played. Marinconz started 169 consecutive games — every game as a freshman, sophomore and junior. Only two Cal Poly players started all 54 games in 2015 — **Peter Van Gansen** and **Jordan Ellis**. **Jimmy Allen** (183 consecutive starts) and **Brian Mundell** started all 59 games in 2014. **Denver Chavez**, Allen and **Nick Torres** started all 59 games in 2013 while Van Gansen (57 starts) played all 59 games. **Mike Miller**, Allen and **Mitch Haniger** started all 56 games in 2012. No Cal Poly player started all 53 games in 2011.

Statistics, Statistics, More Statistics ...

Cal Poly held the lead or was tied in the sixth inning or later in each of the first 10 games played this season ... outhit in 14 of its previous 15 games, Cal Poly outhit Cal State Fullerton in all four games of their 2021 series May 14-16 ... the Mustangs' series win at USC was their first against the Trojans in 27 Division I seasons while the series win over UCLA was their first since 2014 ... in the UCLA series, the team with the most hits in each game lost all three games while the team that scored first also lost all three contests ... Cal Poly's 13-run fifth-inning uprising versus Utah Valley on March 5 was two shy of the school Division I record ... Cal Poly's 14-inning 5-4 loss to BYU in 2020 is the longest game by innings in Baggett Stadium history and just 18 minutes shy of the record for longest game by time ... there have been four 13-inning games inside Baggett Stadium ... Cal Poly held CSUN to just four runs in the 2019 sweep, the lowest total in a three-game series since outscoring Kansas State 18-3 in a 2014 series ... Cal Poly also swept a series to open Big West play in 2014 and 2021, both against UC Davis ... the Mustangs were swept in their first three weekend series of the 2019 season (Oklahoma, Cal, Washington) for the first time in their 25-year Division I history ... Cal Poly's comeback from an 8-0 deficit for an 11-8 win over CSU Bakersfield in 2018 was its largest comeback in the Mustangs' 25 Division I seasons; the Mustangs rallied from a 9-2 deficit to beat Tampa 11-10 in 2000 and erased an 8-1 deficit in a 9-3 win over Washington in 1995 ... against Columbia in 2019, Cal Poly swept a four-game series for the first time since sweeping Pacific opening the 2016 campaign; the Mustangs also swept Loyola Marymount in 2019 ... the Mustangs are 9-0 versus Columbia ... Cal Poly won its final seven games of the 2018 season, matching the school Division I mark set by the 2012 squad for longest winning streak to end the year ... Cal Poly failed to score in 25 consecutive innings in late February 2017, a school Division I record, and was shut out nine times in 2017, another record ... all four extra-inning games in 2018 were 10-inning affairs, Cal Poly posting a 3-1 mark ... in the 2017 season-opening series at Cal, the Mustangs led in all three games, but won just one of the three; in 2019 Cal Poly had a lead or tied with the Bears, but lost all three games; Cal Poly held the early lead in all three games of the CSUN series in 2016, only to be swept by the Matadors for the first time since 2008, and almost did the same in 2018 before rallying late to salvage a win in the finale; Cal Poly also led all three games of the Michigan series in 2020 but won just once ... in 2018 the Mustangs lost two midweek games to Santa Clara for the first time since 2012 and the Broncos swept Cal Poly again in 2019 ... against UC Riverside in 2017, Cal Poly posted two shutouts in a series for the first time since blanking Oklahoma State twice in 2012 and earned back-to-back shutouts for the first time since whitewashing Santa Clara and Seattle in 2014 ... Cal Poly went from 2011-15 without being swept in a Big West series until Long Beach State swept the Mustangs at Blair Field in 2016 ... the Mustangs had won 16 consecutive series against Pacific until the Tigers swept Cal Poly in 2017 ... Cal Poly is 20-5 against Hawaii since the Rainbow Warriors joined the Big West in 2013, including a 13-3 mark at home and 7-2 in Honolulu; the Mustangs have won all eight series, including sweeps in 2014, 2015 and 2021 ... the series at TCU in 2015, wiped out by snow and ice, marks the only time in the Mustangs' 25-year Division I history that an entire series was canceled ... Cal Poly's pair of wins at Oregon State in 2015 were its first against the Beavers since moving to Division I 26 years ago ... Cal Poly has won 268 games over the last eight seasons (2012-19), seventh-most among the 24 Division I teams in California and No. 9 in the 47-team West Region ... the Mustangs, never swept from 2012-14, were swept twice to open the 2015 campaign and, against Grand Canyon, were swept at home for the first time since 2010 (Houston) ... Cal Poly won 18 straight home games, including the last seven of the 2013 season, before failing to Cal 8-3 on March 22, 2014 ... the Mustangs' 17-3 start in 2014 was the second best for 20 games, exceeded by the 18-2 start of the 1997 squad, while the 25-5 mark in 2014 is the best 30-game start in program history ... Cal Poly has swept Cal State Fullerton in back-to-back seasons (2021 and 2022); only other sweep of the Titans since 1973 was during the Mustangs' 2014 Big West championship season ... with 15 strikeouts against Santa Clara in 2014; Matt Imhof broke the school Division I record of 14 set by Mike Zirolli in 1999 and matched by Mason Radeke in 2011 and Imhof twice in 2014; Drew Thorpe equalled the record of 15 versus UC San Diego on March 25 ... prior to the 2014 series win over UCLA, the last time Cal Poly won a series against the Bruins was in 2005, also in Jackie Robinson Stadium ... the Mustangs were 6-3 against Pac-12 teams in 2014, 3-3 in 2015, 1-4 in 2016, 2-5 in 2017, 0-4 in 2018 and 1-9 in 2019 ... Slater Lee's complete-game two-hit shutout at UCLA in 2014 was the Mustangs' first since Mike Zirolli blanked Fresno State in 1996 ... Cal Poly scored 10 runs against CSU Bakersfield on May 14, 2013, snapping a streak of 27 straight games scoring less than 10 runs, and the Mustangs scored 10 or more runs just five times in 2013 (seven in 2014, nine in 2015, five in 2016, seven in 2017) ... the Mustangs' 7-0 start in 2013 was their best to open a year since the 1981 squad also went 7-0 ... both the 1954 and 1974 teams went 8-0 while the school record was set by the 1951 team at 10-0 ... Cal Poly won 14 straight games, including the final seven of the 2012 season, before Washington snapped the streak March 1, 2013 ... in 2014, Jimmy Allen was Cal Poly's only player to homer twice in a game, accomplishing the feat at CSUN; Elliot Stewart (San Francisco), Nick Torres (Washington) and Brian Mundell (Kansas State) all homered twice in a game in 2013 while Mundell (Sacramento State and Cal State Fullerton) and John Schukracht (Long Beach State) accomplished the feat in 2015; there were none in 2016, two in 2017, Alex McKenna homering twice against Santa Clara on April 11 and Elijah Skiptos at UCSB on May 21, and none in 2018; Nick DiCarlo homered twice at Fresno State in 2019 ... Nebraska's 13-run sixth inning in 2018 is the largest against Cal Poly in 25 Division I seasons; CSUN tallied 12 runs in the third inning in 1995, UCSB scored 11 in the sixth inning in 2014, Pepperdine tallied 11 runs in the second inning in 2016 and Seattle scored 10 times in the sixth inning in 2014 ... the Mustangs' 1-0 win over UC Irvine in 2014 was completed in 1 hour, 48 minutes, the fastest game ever in the 22-year history of Baggett Stadium as well as Cal Poly's 28-year Division I history ... No. 2 on the Baggett Stadium list is the 1:54 game against Cal State Fullerton on April 19, 2014 ... all four Mustang games against Sacramento State in March 2015 were completed in less than 2 hours, 20 minutes and the three games in 2016 were completed in 2:38 or less ... the Mustangs have won 30 or more games 12 times in the last 19 seasons and, in 2019, Cal Poly clinched its 17th season of .500 or better since 2000 ... Cal Poly has swept a season-opening series six times in its 25-year Division I history -- Pacific in 2016, Kansas State in 2014, San Francisco in 2013, Oklahoma State in 2012, Fresno State in 2006 and San Diego in 2005 ... Cal Poly opened the 2011 season with six consecutive losses but won 20 of its first 30 games in 2012 ... Cal Poly was 20 games above the .500 mark three times in 2009 and reached plateau five times since moving to Division I in 1995, finally breaking through that barrier for the first time on May 19, 2013, at 37-16 with a 7-2 win over CSUN ... Cal Poly finished 35 games above the .500 mark in 2014 ... the one-hitter by Long Beach State's Shawn Stuart on April 1, 2012, was the first one-hitter thrown against Cal Poly since the Mustangs moved to Division I ... no opponent has no-hit the Mustangs and there have been nine two-hitters, the last one by Baylor on March 15, 2019 ... in 2012 Cal Poly swept UC Irvine for the first time in series history; the Mustangs handed the Anteaters their first conference series sweep since 2006 -- a stretch of 48 consecutive series -- and, as a result of the 6-0 series opener, gave UC Irvine its first loss in a conference series opener since 2008, snapping a string of 25 conference series-opening wins ... Cal Poly was 15-17 at home in 2010, the only time the Mustangs have finished below .500 in 19 seasons at Baggett Stadium; the 2019 squad was 16-14 ... Cal Poly won 13 of 14 weekend series in 2014 and 11 of 14 weekend series in 2009 (four sweeps) ... the 2014 squad won eight straight games before falling to Cal on March 22 and had a 12-game winning streak halted by Long Beach State on April 27 ... longest winning streak by the 2015 club was five games, the 2016 team won six in a row, the 2017 Mustangs won five straight, the 2018 squad closed out the year with seven consecutive wins and the 2019 team won six in a row ... in 2005 Cal Poly swept Fresno State in a three-game series for the first time in the then-60-year history of the rivalry, duplicated the feat opening the 2006 campaign in Baggett Stadium and did it again in 2007 at Pete Beiden Field ... the Mustangs have won 22 of their last 35 games against the Bulldogs, including three of five games during Fresno State's national championship season in 2008; the Bulldogs won both meetings in 2017 and 2019 (the two teams did not play each other in 2018) and won six straight until the Mustangs snapped the run with an 8-4 victory Feb. 22 ... Cal Poly won 11 straight games against Fresno State prior to two losses to the Bulldogs in March 2008 ... the Mustangs swept UC Riverside in 2012 for the first time since 2000, duplicated the feat in 2013, 2015 and 2018 and won five straight series, taking 13 of 15 games, before losing two of three contests in 2017 ... in 2019, Cal Poly won a series at Blair Field for the first time in 10 years and swept the Dribbags on the road for the first time since 1997 ... Long Beach State was 16-2 in a six-year stretch against the Mustangs until Cal Poly won two of three in 2009, its first series win at Blair Field since 1997, and also won two of three in 2010 at home ... the Dribbags won four straight series against Cal Poly from 2011-14, all two games to one ... Cal Poly's sweep of the Dribbags in 2019 was its second straight and second since 1997 ... the Mustangs have won 51 of their last 87 games against UC Santa Barbara with sweeps in 2012, 2016, 2017 (the first at UCSB since 2007) and 2018 and are 20-14 in the last 11 seasons against four-time national champion Cal State Fullerton, winning 16 of the last 25 meetings ... UC Irvine had won four straight series against the Mustangs until Cal Poly swept the Anteaters in 2012 ... all three games of the 2017 series against the Anteaters were decided by one run ... Cal Poly won seven straight series against UC Davis until losing two of three at Dobbins Stadium in 2012, swept the Aggies in 2013 and 2014, also swept UC Davis at Dobbins for the first time on April 12-14, 2019, and is 45-13 all-time against the Aggies, who are 2-19 at Baggett Stadium since joining the Big West in 2008 and 3-24 all-time at Baggett Stadium ... Cal Poly won eight straight games against CSUN prior to a 6-4 setback in May 2015 ... the Mustangs won eight straight from 2017-19 and are 25-10 against CSU Bakersfield ... Cal Poly's 28-2 loss to Long Beach State on April 9, 2022, is the worst in Baggett Stadium history, followed by the 19-0 loss to UCLA on Feb. 27, 2016.

Pitching Milestones

It's been 19 years since Cal Poly recorded its first no-hitter in more than three decades -- March 28, 2003 -- as left-hander **Garrett Olson** and right-hander **Tony Sajpe** combined to no-hit Southern Utah, 7-0, in the nightcap of a doubleheader at Cedar City, Utah. Olson pitched 7 1/3 innings and walked five while striking out six. Sajpe secured the final five outs with two strikeouts. It is the only no-hitter for Cal Poly since moving to Division I prior to the 1995 season. The game was played in 40-degree weather with light snow flurries and winds up to 25 mph. Prior to that game, the last Mustang no-hitter was recorded by **Les Ohri** in a 1-0 win over Cal Poly Pomona on May 8, 1971. On March 26, 1970, **Dean Treanor** no-hit Cal Poly Pomona, 2-0, on the Mustangs' campus diamond. Two weeks after the Southern Utah no-hitter, Olson blanked Pacific 4-0 with a three-hitter, Cal Poly's first nine-inning shutout by a single pitcher since **Chad Snowden** blanked UC Santa Barbara 4-0 on March 8, 1997 in SLO Stadium. There have been 12 complete-game shutouts since Olson's gem, including three in 2014 (**Slater Lee**, **Matt Imhof**, **Casey Bloomquist**), two in 2016 (**Kyle Smith**, **Erich Uelmen**), one in 2017 (**Erich Uelmen**) and one in 2018 (**Trent Shelton**).

Big West Leaders

After the 14th weekend of the 2022 season, Cal Poly finds itself No. 1 in the Big West in batting average (.292), hits (565), doubles (123), sacrifice flies (32), walks allowed per nine innings (3.06), strikeouts per nine innings (9.8) and strikeout-to-walk ratio (3.19) and is No. 2 in runs scored (360), walks (246), shutouts (5), slugging percentage (.436), on-base percentage (.379) and win-loss percentage (.636). Individually, Mustangs ranked No. 1 include **Brooks Lee** in doubles (24), slugging percentage (.694), total bases (154), on-base percentage (.476), hits (83), RBIs (54) and walks (44). **Drew Thorpe** is No. 1 with 139 strikeouts and No. 2 in strikeouts per nine innings (12.94) while **Ryan Stafford** is No. 1 with six sacrifice flies. **Joe Yorke** is third with 34 walks and third with four sacrifice flies. Thorpe and **Travis Weston**'s 14 starts are No. 1 while **Jason Franks**' 29 appearances on the mound are No. 2 and his nine saves are No. 2. Thorpe's nine wins are No. 1 while **Zach Button** is No. 2 with eight victories.

Big West Finishes ...

Prior to capturing the championship in 2014, Cal Poly's best finishes in the Big West were second place alone in 2012 (16-8), a tie for second place with Long Beach State in 2005 (14-7) and another tie for second place with UC Santa Barbara in 2013 (17-10). The Mustangs, who earned their fourth second-place finish (16-8) in 2017, fifth (15-9) in 2018 and sixth (17-7) in 2019, also were third in 2002 (15-9), 2009 (14-10) and 2011 (15-9), tied for third in 2000 (18-12) and fourth in 2003 (9-12), 2004 (10-11), 2006 (10-11), 2007 (13-8), 2015 (14-10), 2016 (12-12) and 2021 (21-19). The Mustangs joined the Big West in 1997 and have a combined 331-277 conference record (.544 winning percentage) for 24 seasons, finishing in the top four 16 times in the last 18 years, including 2021 but not the pandemic-shortened 2020 season when no conference games were played.

Big West Teams Back on the Losing Side Versus Non-Conference Foes

Last week, Big West teams posted a winning mark in a week against non-conference foes for just the fourth time this season, going 5-2. The 11 clubs were 7-5 in Week 12, 8-3 in Week 13, 9-2 in Week 7 and also were 19-19 in Week 2 and 20-20 in Week 4. The Big West is 112-138 for the season. In Big West play last weekend, there were three sweeps -- Cal Poly against UC Davis, UCSB versus UC Riverside and Hawai'i at UCSD. In 2021, Big West teams had a sub-.500 record against non-conference foes for the third time in five seasons after posting four straight winning campaigns from 2013-16. The Big West's 11 teams were 60-68 against non-conference opponents during the 2021 season while the nine conference teams were a combined 79-61 in 2020, including a 13-2 start by UC Santa Barbara. Big West teams were 123-145 in 2019. In 2018, the Big West was 4-2 in the postseason for a 119-119 mark overall. Big West teams were 10-6 in the 2017 postseason and finished 134-141-1 against non-conference foes for the year, snapping a streak of four seasons with a winning mark. The nine Big West teams were 169-121-1 in 2016. UC Santa Barbara advanced all the way to the College World Series and finished with a 6-2 postseason mark. The Big West was 159-128-2 against non-conference teams for the 2015 season. Big West teams finished the 2014 regular season 162-109 and were 12-9 in the postseason for a 174-118 overall mark against non-conference opposition. All four Big West teams in the 2014 regionals reached the championship finals with UC Irvine advancing to the Super Regionals and the College World Series. Big West teams were 139-145 against non-conference opponents in 2012, resulting in just one team -- Cal State Fullerton -- advancing to the postseason for the first time in 26 years.

Mustang Notes

Class-by-Class Breakdown

The 2022 Cal Poly baseball team has nine freshmen, 15 sophomores, six juniors and five seniors -- fifth-year third baseman Tate Samuelson, pitchers Dylan Villalobos and Darren Nelson, catcher Mark Armstrong and designated hitter Matt Lopez. Cal Poly had just one senior in 2021 (catcher Myles Emmerson), five in 2020, two in 2016 and 2019, four in the 2012, 2013 and 2014 seasons and five in both 2017 and 2018.

Retired Numbers

Four Cal Poly jerseys have been retired, but only three numbers. That's because catcher John Orton and outfielder Monty Waltz both wore No. 9. Pitcher Mike Krukow's jersey (21) has been retired as well as that of shortstop Ozzie Smith (3).

Mustangs in the Top 100

Among the 359 current and former Division I baseball programs in the NCAA, Cal Poly ranked No. 76 in total number of victories through the 2021 season with 2,019 wins over 117 seasons. Since the first baseball game played at Cal Poly in 1905, the Mustangs have compiled a 2,019-1,792-15 record (.530 winning percentage). The national leader is Fordham with 4,551 wins in 161 seasons, followed by Texas (3,576), Michigan (2,997) and Southern California (3,139). Among Big West teams, Cal Poly is behind only Cal State Fullerton (2,135).

New Rules for 2021 and 2022 Seasons

NCAA teams are in the second year of a two-year cycle of new rules for the 2021 and 2022 seasons. The only addition to the rule book for 2022 permits the use of exclusively one-way electronic communication device(s) from the dugout to the field. Thus, fans will see catchers with an electronic communication device connected with a coach in the dugout to call pitches and plays. Teams also may opt to use an electronic display board from the dugout that shows a numerical code to call pitches and/or defensive plays.

Kissing Your Sister

For three straight years (2002-04), Cal Poly had a tie on its record. The Mustangs and San Jose State tied 6-6 in a game Feb. 6, 2004 called after seven innings due to darkness. Cal Poly tied Gonzaga 8-8 on March 12, 2003, in a tournament game at Fresno and battled Hawaii-Hilo to an 8-8 draw on Jan. 21, 2002, the first tie in 20 years. In 1982, the Mustangs and UC Santa Barbara battled to a 10-10 draw. Cal Poly has not had a tie on its record since 2004.

Big West Fifth in Nation in Major League Draftees

Among the 31 NCAA Division I conferences in the nation, the Big West annually is ranked among the top five in terms of the number of players drafted. The 2021 draft, reduced to 20 rounds, included 17 Big West players on the draftboards. A total of 27 players from Big West schools were selected in the 2019 draft, exceeded only by the SEC, Big 12, Pac-12 and Atlantic Coast. One Cal Poly player was selected that year (Bobby Ay in the ninth round by Arizona) and three were chosen in 2018 (Alex McKenna, Nick Meyer and Kyle Marinconz). A total of 76 Cal Poly players have been drafted in the last 19 years, including right-handed pitcher Taylor Dillard in the fifth round by the Seattle Mariners in 2020 and Bryan Woo (sixth round, Mariners) and Andrew Alvarez (12th round, Nationals), both in 2021. Also, since 1990 the Big West has the sixth-best winning percentage in College World Series play, posting a 31-35 record.

Mustangs in the Professional Ranks

A total of 18 former Mustang baseball players played professionally in the summer of 2021. Last summer, three ex-Mustangs played in the Major Leagues -- outfielder Mitch Haniger with the Seattle Mariners, right-hander Spencer Howard with the Philadelphia Phillies and Texas Rangers, and southpaw Justin Bruhl with the Los Angeles Dodgers. Utility player Mark Mathias of the Milwaukee Brewers missed the entire season due to injury. Those in the minors in 2021 included pitchers Chase Johnson at El Paso and Erich Uelmen at Iowa, catcher Nick Meyer at Syracuse, infielders Kyle Marinconz at Harrisburg, Peter Van Gansen at El Paso and outfielders Nick Torres at Laguna (Mexican League) and Zack Zehner at Scranton/Wilkes-Barre and Jacksonville in Triple-A; outfielders Bradlee Beesley at Tennessee, Alex McKenna at Corpus Christi and Elijah Greene at Rocket City in Double-A; and pitcher Joey Wagman in the 2020 Olympics for Team Israel.

Triple Plays

Cal Poly has hit into a pair of triple plays since moving to Division I prior to the 1995 season. Against Pepperdine on May 18, 2010, in Baggett Stadium, two Mustang batters drew walks and, with the runners going, Bobby Crocker lined out to Pepperdine shortstop Zach Vincej. Vincej flipped the ball to second baseman Joe Sever for the second out and Sever tagged the runner from first base to complete the triple play. In Cal Poly's next-to-last game of the 2003 season at Stanford, the Mustangs hit into their first Division I triple play. Sam Herbert led off the game with a single and Scott Anderson walked. Adam Leavitt lined out to Cardinal first baseman John Mayberry Jr. Mayberry stepped on the bag for the second out and threw to shortstop Tobin Swope to complete the triple play. The Mustangs have not turned a double play since moving to Division I in 1995.

- Finished tied for fourth with CSUN and UC San Diego in Big West, climbing six spots in final three weeks of season

Mustang Notes

Success in the Big West

Since and including 2011, Cal Poly is the only Big West team to have a .500 or better overall record each year (excluding the pandemic-shortened 2020 season). Also since 2011, Cal Poly is the only Big West team to finish at least fourth or higher every year, including one first place, five seconds, one third and three fourths. Since 2003, Cal Poly has finished below fourth place only twice (2008, 2010). Since joining the Big West prior to the 1997 season, Cal Poly has had 19 MLB draft picks in the first four rounds; only Cal State Fullerton has had more with 22; the next tier are three teams with a total of 10 in that time span. Cal Poly went from 2011-15 without being swept in a Big West series until Long Beach State swept the Mustangs at Blair Field in 2016. Cal Poly is 20-5 against Hawai'i since the Rainbow Warriors joined the Big West in 2013, including a 13-3 mark at home and 7-2 in Honolulu; the Mustangs have won all eight series, including sweeps in 2014, 2015 and 2021. The Mustangs have won 51 of their last 87 games against UC Santa Barbara with sweeps in 2012, 2016, 2017 (the first at UCSB since 2007) and 2018 and are 20-14 in the last 11 seasons against four-time national champion Cal State Fullerton, winning 16 of the last 25 meetings. Cal Poly won seven straight series against UC Davis until losing two of three at Dobbins Stadium in 2012, swept the Aggies in 2013 and 2014, also swept UC Davis at Dobbins for the first time in April 2019, and is 45-13 all-time against the Aggies, who are 2-19 at Baggett Stadium since joining the Big West in 2008 and 3-24 all-time in San Luis Obispo. The Mustangs won eight straight against CSU Bakersfield from 2017-19 and are 25-10 after sweeping the Roadrunners in 2022. Cal Poly has won six straight and 10 of the last 11 games versus CSUN.

Working Overtime

Cal Poly's first extra-inning game of 2022 was a 7-6 loss March 4 at UNLV as the Rebels overcame a 6-4 deficit with three runs in the bottom of the 10th inning. The Mustangs edged UC Riverside 4-3 in 11 innings on April 23 as **Mark Armstrong**'s pinch-hit double down the right-field line scored **Brooks Lee** from second base, and fell 10-7 in 11 innings to UC Santa Barbara on April 29. The Mustangs played just two extra-inning games last season, losing to Nevada 11-8 in 10 innings on Feb. 21 and 2-1 to UC Santa Barbara in 11 innings on May 1. In 2020, despite playing just 16 games, the Mustangs split a quartet of overtime contests. Cal Poly lost the first one Feb. 22, a 5-4 BYU victory in 14 innings, the longest game by innings in Baggett Stadium history, and split two 10-inning contests with Michigan on Feb. 28-29, losing 4-3 and winning 5-4, respectively. The Mustangs edged Baylor 2-1 in 11 innings March 6. Cal Poly's first extra-inning game of 2019 resulted in a 12-inning 2-1 victory over Columbia. The Mustangs fell to Santa Clara 7-6 in 10 innings and to Pepperdine 6-5 in 11 innings, finishing 1-2 in overtime contests. Cal Poly played back-to-back extra-inning games to open the 2018 campaign and finished the year 3-1, all 10-inning affairs, with wins over Gonzaga, New Mexico and UC Riverside and a loss to New Mexico. After playing eight extra-inning games in 2003 and six more in 2004, Cal Poly played just 10 extra-inning games from 2005-08. The Mustangs, however, played five overtime contests in 2009, all at home, and won them all. Cal Poly won all four of its extra-inning games of the 2010 season and was 1-2 in both 2011 and 2012. A streak of 10 consecutive extra-inning wins by the Mustangs was snapped March 29, 2011, by Pepperdine as the Waves beat the Mustangs 7-4 in 11 innings. The Mustangs are 47-27 in extra-inning affairs since moving to Division I prior to the 1995 season, including two victories in 2013, one in 2014, one in 2015, two in both the 2016 and 2017 seasons and three in 2018.

Twin Killings

After turning just two double plays in its first 14 games of 2022, the Mustangs turned three twin killings in the March 12 nightcap against Harvard and one more the next day. They have 35 in 55 games so far. Cal Poly turned 47 double plays in 56 games last season, best in the Big West and No. 11 in the nation. By contrast, the current squad has turned just two double plays in its first 12 games. In 2020, the Mustangs turned two double plays in the season-opening MLB4 Tournament, both against Michigan, and had five for the shortened year. Cal Poly opened the 2019 campaign by turning just one double play in a three-game series at Oklahoma but had 46 for the year, tied for No. 2 in the Big West. The record for double plays in one game is five, turned in 2004, against Santa Clara. Cal Poly turned 65 double plays in 2003, the most since moving up to Division I prior to the 1995 season.

Another Tough Schedule ...

Cal Poly's schedule after the Pepperdine game is ranked as the 175th toughest among 301 NCAA Division I schools this season and the Mustangs' RPI is 105 (falling four spots after sweeping UC Davis). A year ago, WarrenNolan.com rated Cal Poly's schedule after the season-ending Hawai'i series as the 210th toughest in the nation while its RPI was No. 151, a rise of 22 after sweeping the Rainbow Warriors. At the end of the Mustangs' 2014 Big West Conference championship season, WarrenNolan.com had Cal Poly with an RPI of 16, though Cal Poly's strength of schedule was No. 146. Cal Poly finished the 2010 season with the 13th-toughest schedule in the nation and opened the 2008 campaign with the 13th-toughest schedule in the nation, was No. 1 midway through and finished No. 7. Boydsworld ranked Cal Poly as having the 10th-toughest schedule in 2006 and 18th-toughest schedule in 2005.

Homegrown Product ...

Cal Poly, which had a Division I-record seven out-of-state players on its baseball roster in 2018, had six from outside California in both 2019 and 2020 and five last spring. This year, just two — pitcher **Drew Thorpe** from Washington, Utah, and outfielder **Reagan Doss** from Round Rock, Texas. The three players with Central Coast roots are shortstop **Brooks Lee** from San Luis Obispo High School and catcher **Mark Armstrong** and pitcher **Jakob Wright**, both from Paso Robles High School.

Hawai'i is hitting .272 as a team with 82 doubles, four triples and 32 home runs, scoring 298 runs in its 49 games so far. The Rainbow Warriors are second in the Big West in sacrifice bunts (36) and stolen bases (56) and third in fielding percentage (.973), batters hit by their pitchers (78), on-base percentage (.376), scoring (6.1 runs per game) and shutouts (3). The pitching staff has compiled a 4.71 ERA with 422 strikeouts over 438 innings, and Hawai'i has committed 50 errors in 49 games.

Hawai'i is coming off a 24-26 campaign, finishing eighth in the Big West at 16-24. Hawai'i played its first Big West season in baseball in 2013 after 33 years in the Western Athletic Conference, claiming titles in 1991, 1992 and 2011 and the tournament crown in 2010. Cal Poly also played in the WAC in 1995 and 1996 before joining the Big West. The Rainbow Warriors reached the College World Series in 1980, finishing second, and have made 13 NCAA regional appearances, the last in 2010.

Coached by Rich Hill (first season at Hawai'i (27-22), 37th year overall (1,106-760-4), Cal Lutheran '84), the Rainbow Warriors returned 22 letter winners from last year's squad, including 11 position starters and nine pitchers. Top returnees include utility player Jacob Igawa (.321, 23 RBIs in 2021), outfielder Scotty Scott (.297, 14 RBIs) and catcher Jared Quandt (.310). Topping the list of returning pitchers are right-handers Cade Halemanu (5-2, 3.60 ERA in 2021) and Buddie Pindel (3-2, 3.43 ERA) along with southpaw Austin Teixeira (3-2, 4.06).

Shortstop Jordan Donahue tops all Hawai'i hitters with a .322 average, six doubles and 18 RBIs, while second baseman Stone Miyao is hitting .296 with eight doubles and 35 RBIs. Utility player Dallas Duarte sports a .293 average with 10 doubles and 26 RBIs, right fielder Matt Wong .286 with 11 doubles, five home runs and 35 RBIs and former Cal Poly center fielder Cole Cabrera .281 with eight doubles, four home runs and 33 RBIs along with 14 steals in 16 attempts.

The pitching staff is paced by Blaze Koihi Pontes (5-0, 3.05 ERA), Halemanu (3-5, 4.96 ERA) and Andy Archer (2-5, 5.40 ERA), all right-handers. The closer is righty Dalton Renze (4-2, 3.79 ERA, six saves).

Cal Poly has a 27-11 advantage over Hawai'i in the series dating back to 1995, sweeping a four-game series at Baggett Stadium to close out the 2021 season. Cal Poly is 20-5 against Hawai'i since the Rainbow Warriors joined the Big West in 2013, including a 13-3 mark at home and 7-2 in Honolulu. The Mustangs have won all eight series, including sweeps in 2014, 2015 and 2021. Cal Poly won two of three games at home in 2019 as well as in Manoa in 2018. Larry Lee is 20-5 against Hawai'i while Rich Hill is 17-11 against Cal Poly, all while he was head coach at San Diego.

Among the 17 former Rainbow Warriors who made it to the Major Leagues are Kolten Wong, Josh Rojas and Glenn Braggs. Hill was head coach at San Diego for 23 seasons (1999-2021), guiding the Toreros to nine NCAA postseason appearances and seven West Coast Conference championships, before he was named to replace Mike Trapasso as head coach at Hawai'i in June 2021. Also a head coach at San Francisco from 1994-98 and his alma mater, Cal Lutheran (1988-93), Hill has won 1,106 games in nearly 37 years as a head coach at the college level. Hill played baseball at San Diego State and Cal Lutheran before spending one year in the St. Louis Cardinals minor league system.

Lee welcomed back 22 lettermen off last year's squad, including seven position starters and all but three pitchers. The 2022 Mustang roster, bolstered by the addition of three transfers from Boise State and one from Washington State a year ago, added a pair of graduate students this spring in infielder Brett Borgogno (Cal State Fullerton and Louisiana-Lafayette) and outfielder John Lagattuta (Cal) along with utility player Matthias Haas, a transfer from Brown.

Topping the list of returnees is five-time 2021 All-American Brooks Lee, a preseason All-American five times as well this spring. Projected to be a top-five draft pick in July, Lee hit a team-leading .342 with 10 home runs, 57 RBIs and a school-record 27 doubles as a redshirt freshman in 2021 en route to Big West Co-Field Player of the Year and Co-Freshman Field Player of the Year honors.

The group of returnees also includes designated hitter Matt Lopez, third baseman Tate Samuelson, first baseman Joe Yorke, second baseman Nick Marinconz, utility player Taison Corio and pitchers Drew Thorpe, Travis Weston, Bryce Warrecker, Kyle Scott and Dylan Villalobos, among several others.

The entire infield is back as Yorke made 54 starts at first base, Marinconz (27) and Corio (23) combined for 50 starts at second base, Lee started 54 games at shortstop and Samuelson was in the starting lineup 53 times at third base. As the team's designated hitter, Lopez was second on the team in hitting at .341 with 26 RBIs in 39 games.

The outfield has been a season-long work in progress with the loss of Cole Cabrera in center field, Sam Biller in left and Nick DiCarlo in right. Reagan Doss, who started 21 games in the outfield last year and hit .258 with six doubles and 13 RBIs in 37 games, replaces Cabrera in center field. A pair of catchers lead the depth chart in left field — Ryan Stafford of Folsom High School and returnee Collin Villegas — while Haas of Oakland's Bishop O'Dowd High School and Brown and Lagattuta of Davis Senior High School and Cal likely will share duties in right field. Stafford has made 42 starts behind the plate and Villegas 13 with 30 additional starts in the outfield.

On the mound Drew Thorpe was 6-1 with a 3.15 ERA in home games last spring, finishing with a 6-6 mark and 3.79 ERA. He led the squad in strikeouts with 104, which is No. 10 all-time in the Cal Poly record book, and compiled double-digit strikeouts three times in 2021. Travis Weston (5-6, 3.28 ERA) earned three complete games, the most by a Mustang pitcher since Joey Wagman also collected three complete games in 2013. Weston was a starter in Saturday doubleheaders.

Thorpe and Weston will start Friday and Saturday, respectively, for the second year in a row. Sophomore Kaden Sheedy (1-2, 5.40 ERA in 2021) got the nod for the first four Sunday games this season with freshman right-hander Steven Brooks of Cosumnes Oaks High School in Elk Grove, Calif., starting the midweek contests. Sheedy made four starts in the final six weeks of the 2021 season, including a complete-game three-hitter with six strikeouts in the series finale at UC Davis.

So far this season, Lee leads all Mustang hitters with a .374 mark, third in the Big West, which includes 24 doubles, a triple, 15 home runs and 54 RBIs. He is on pace to surpass his own school doubles record (27) set last year as well as his 57 total RBIs in 2021, and had a career-long 19-game hitting streak snapped by Long Beach State eight weeks ago. With a two-run home run Sunday, Lee homered in all four games last week and moved into a tie for fifth place with Grant Desme (2007) and Luke Yoder (2010) in Cal Poly's record book for home runs in a single season. Lee also has 25 home runs in his Mustang career, fifth all-time at Cal Poly.

Yorke is hitting .352 with 12 doubles, four home runs, 46 RBIs and a 20-game hitting streak that was snapped Sunday by UC Davis. The Mustang first baseman produced a pair of five-hit games a four-hit contest and a quartet of three-hit games during his hitting streak, going 45-for-92 (.489) with eight doubles, three home runs and 24 RBIs, lifting his average for the season 105 points. He has reached base safely in 29 consecutive games.

Sophomore second baseman Nick Marinconz sports a .319 average with nine doubles, a home run and 16 RBIs while Stafford is hitting .328 with 16 doubles, three home runs and 33 RBIs. Matt Lopez has a .299 average with nine doubles, four home runs and 24 RBIs while Collin Villegas is hitting .289 with 19 doubles, two triples, four home runs and 40 RBIs.

During the current winning streak, Yorke is 27-for-50 (.540) with seven doubles, two home runs and 19 RBIs while Stafford has gone 24-for-46 (.522) with three doubles and 16 RBIs. Lee is hitting .408 (20-for-49) with five doubles, six home runs and 14 RBIs, with Lopez going 15-for-37 (.405) with three doubles, two home runs and 10 RBIs.

The Mustangs have hit .365 during the streak, outscoring the opposition 99-25, with just eight errors in 11 games while the pitching staff has put together a 1.82 ERA with 117 strikeouts over 99 innings and a .232 opponents batting average.

Stafford has played 11 games since he was dropped from the leadoff spot to the fourth and fifth holes in the lineup and has responded with an 11-game hitting streak, including eight multiple-hit games, and bumping his average up 48 points.

With three games to go in the regular season, Samuelson has already broken school records for most games played (233) and at-bats (899) in a career and is No. 2 in hits (246), tied for No. 2 in RBIs (158) and fifth in hit by pitches (29). The Super Senior is six shy of the hits record set by Jimmy Allen from 2011-14 and two short of the RBI mark held by Steve Wood (1998-2000).

Lee (20th season, 612-475-2, Pepperdine '83) reached the 600-victory milestone April 22 with a 9-3 nod over UC Riverside. He earned 460 wins in 16 seasons at Cuesta College and notched his 460th Mustang victory on March 13, 2017 against Gonzaga and his 1,000th career victory with a 3-0 triumph at UC Santa Barbara on May 23, 2019. He currently has a 1,072-715 record over 35-plus seasons as a head coach and coached his 1,000th game as Cal Poly's head coach on April 1, 2021, a 10-1 win over UC San Diego.

The 16 regional hosts will be announced Sunday, with the 64-team NCAA regional field to be revealed Monday at 9 a.m. on ESPN2.
